## SOCIETY UPDATE: By Kevin Chard (Chairman).

December 2024

e have made the decision to move to Holy Saviour Church, Bitterne for our Tuesday evening meetings in 2025. There are 2 main reasons for this:

- The venue is served by a better bus service
- It offers limited storage space so that we can continue to run our Auctions.
- Details of where the venue is, car parking and main bus options are on the website and Pages 18 and 19.

We have also made changes to our programme:

- There will be only 3 evening Auctions and only 3 editions of Postmark.
- We have cancelled meetings that clash with Europhilex.
- The savings made in room hire and printing will balance the loss of Auction revenue. The full programme is on page 5-7. These changes were approved by a meeting of the full Committee. There are other issues that will need to be discussed at the AGM:
- Evening meeting attendance numbers our hope is that numbers will recover with the new venue. If they do not, we will reduce the number of evening meeting for 2026 and beyond or even change to afternoon meetings only.
- Membership fee the current membership fee is less than the costs incurred per member. The proposal will be to change this for 2026 and beyond. We would also offer a digital membership lower fee to reflect the reduction in costs from printing and postage.
- Profits from Auctions and the Packet can then be used for more social type activities catered meetings, coach trips, support for local events such as the ABPS conference, better raffle prizes, etc. Funds would be available but we will need people to organise these activities, see point below.
- Vacancies we still need more help to run the Society. Some vacancies have been advertised already but any offer of support will be welcomed. (See Page 4).



often see mail going to 70/71 High Street, Southampton and I came across this item that that was posted on the 25th October arriving on the 26th October 1927. I have added this to my Southampton collection. The item was posted for 1d BUT incurred postage due of 2d 'Liable to Letter Rate 723. This is now the site of Telephone House (No.70 - No75).

The insurance cover was sent by the County Fire Office Limited, Regent Street, London. An English insurance business founded in 1807 by John Thomas Barber Beaumont.

### OBITUARY ~ MIKE VOKES MBE 1941 To 2024. By Peter Bruce (Chandler's Ford Convenor). December 2024

any Postmark readers will already have heard the sad news that Mike Vokes passed away in early December 2024. He was diagnosed with a form of lung cancer at the beginning of 2023 and passed away peacefully at the Countess Mountbatten Hospice.

I first met Mike more than 20 years ago when my wife Cathy and I joined the Worthy Down Stamp Club where he was also a member. We ended up being good friends and would meet up regularly both at Worthy Down and later also at Southampton Philatelic. He was an active member at Southampton Philatelic and became Membership Secretary and Convenor of the Chandler's Ford afternoon meetings until ill health obliged him to step back from both roles. His collecting interests covered GB and some selected Commonwealth countries as well as a thematic collection of lighthouses on stamps.

Mike was born in Kingsworthy and could trace his family back several hundred years in the Winchester area. He went to school in Winchester and then took up a career in Customs and Excise which lasted nearly 40 years. He was also involved in the Territorial Army and served in that for some 55 years! He also found time to be involved with Peter Symonds school as a governor and Winchester Cathedral as a Choirman and Cathedral guide. His involvement in the community was recognised when he was awarded the MBE.

Other interests included birdwatching, gardening, model railways and sport. Together with his wife Mo he enjoyed cruising, particularly to the Caribbean, and would sometimes bring back some philatelic item from a Caribbean island to show at our afternoon meetings.

Mike's contribution to the society, as committee member, meeting convenor, speaker at meetings and simply a friend was much appreciated and he will be sorely missed.

When I opened the parcel, it contained two rhinoceroses made on a wire frame and made with coloured beads.

Paul battled on with health issues that were to see his leg amputated and using a wheelchair. Paul will be missed as a member of the Society and by those who knew him.

#### 1st October - And I Still Don't Know What to Collect!

ur October speaker, Paul Latham-Warde, gave members a truly energetic, enthralling and interesting display of some very different topics and material which was enjoyed by all. Topics ranged from a 3-D exhibit of antique letter scales, Barbed Wire, Poor Law letters, Health Insurance stamps, Revenues, Cut and Torn Paper, India Relief Fund, the Renault 2CV and Helicopters. Many topics were shown as 16 sheet competition exhibits to show others what could be done in a novel and distinctive way. It was a great evening's entertainment.

### 3rd December - The Germany & Colonies Philatelic Society.

or our December meeting we were delighted to host two local members of the Germany and Colonies Society: Robin Pizer FRPSL and Rex Dixon FRPSL. Robin showed us part of his postal history collection formed over many, many years relating to the policing of money exchange controls set up by the German Government immediately after WWI to stave off monetary collapse caused by the pressure of reparations imposed by the Allies. The talk included amusing examples of how stamp dealers tried to circumvent the controls to provide new issues of foreign stamp sets to collectors within Germany. Many covers showed large denomination German adhesives and multi-rate frankings. Rex followed in the second half by showing stamps issued by the various East and West German States as well as partitioned Berlin immediately after the end of WWII. Examples of sheets of early local printings as well as printings by American and French printers were shown. Examples of usages within East and West Germany were also displayed. Society President Julian Jones gave a vote of thanks and offered the usual certificates and beverage gifts. **Julian Jones.** (President).

## Southampton Paquebot Slogan 'Leukaemia'... By Malcolm Montgomery (MBE). December 2024



was sorting out Southampton slogan postmarks recently and discovered one that should have been included in my 'Paquebot Slogan' collection (such as it is!): 'Leukaemia Research Fund - 1968.1 A postcard of R.M.S. 'Queen Elizabeth', on return from her last voyage from the United States, previously un-recorded and several years later than other paquebot slogans. The discovery set me to tidying up my collection. In so doing, I discovered

another study, 2 available on the internet, that listed British slogan postmarks in the period to 1957 and recorded known issues of slogan postmarks by office, including Southampton, by 'a', 'b', and 'Paquebot'. The 1968 'Leukaemia' postmark falls outside of the period of that study, but it is relevant in listing earlier Southampton paquebot slogan postmarks. I have e-mailed Martin Grier, the author, but received no reply.

A while ago 'SDPS' conducted a brief study of known examples of these marks. As far as I am aware the Grier lists were not consulted (at least, not by me) ... there are marks in his list not included in our collation, most have now been 're-discovered' by SDPS members, but there are other marks that we have recorded that are missing from his list. There is also one on his list, #143 'Volunteer for a Forces Career', 23 May-21 June 1947, that I have never seen on a paquebot cover.

I am preparing an up-date to the SDPS list, if space allows a simplified version could be appended to this article; in the meantime, I would welcome any other examples that readers may have.

One last thought: if anybody can explain Southampton 'a', and Southampton 'b', mentioned in Grier's lists ... I confess my ignorance, but assume two sorting offices (other than the docks), but would be grateful for your views (remember, I live in North Wales, so cannot consult local facilities!). The editor has my e-mail.

### Holy Saviour Bitterne Church.

Where Is It? The east end of Bitterne Shopping Precinct – behind the Red Lion Pub and Iceland. (It's NOT the United Reformed Church.) How to get there:

### By Car:

From the west, turn right off Peartree Avenue or left off West End Road into Angel Crescent where there is a large car park behind Sainsbury Supermarket. (Pear Tree Gardens Car Park is within the SO18 5RS post code).

Coming from the east filter left off the A3024 signed "Bitterne, Woolston, West End" and first left into Angel Crescent where there is another fairly large car park.

(The two ends of Angel Crescent do not join up for vehicle access.)

There is very limited parking outside the church in Bursledon Road.

Slightly farther afield there is a small car park in White's Road and another on the corner of Commercial Street and Haynes Road (behind Bitterne Library.) There is a pedestrian subway under the A3024.

There may be on street parking in White's Road and Brownlow Avenue.

### **Parking Charges:**

Sadly Southampton City Council is consulting on the introduction of after 6pm parking charges for all these car parks, which we only discovered after we were committed to the move. £1.50 for 3 hours was suggested as possible by the Evening Echo.

### **Disabled Parking:**

By the main entrance of the church. Go down Bursledon Road (from Maybray King Way) and turn left just before the bollards across the road. The entrance looks narrow on Google Maps but it seems to have been widened!

### By Bus.

The following Blue Star bus routes stop at Bitterne Shops bus stop, which is just a few minute's walk from the church:-

- 3 Southampton to Eastleigh. (Terminates at 8pm).
- 10 Southampton to Sholing (via Woolston). (Terminates at 8pm).
- 13 Southampton to Harefield (via Woolston).
- 14 Southampton to Hedge End.
- 16 Southampton to Townhill Park.
- 18 Millbrook to Thornhill (via City Centre).

Services from the City Centre are frequent to get you to meetings for the start time. Not all these routes continue as late as our finish time but routes 14, 16 & 18 run services back into the City Centre at 20.57, 21.08 & 21.29. The last bus from Bitterne Shops back to Woolston is route 13 at 2044.

## A TALE OF TWO POSTCARDS... By Mike Torreggiani...

### December 2024



he postcard in question is one of Winkle Street in Calbourne near Newport and published by Peacocks in the early 1900s. Postmarked Calbourne Oct 8 1907 and cancelled at Newport, the card travelled on the afternoon train from Freshwater to Newport,


being picked up at Calbourne station at 4.44pm, arriving in Newport at 5.03pm, where the stamp was cancelled at 7.30. As it was addressed to Totland Bay it would have travelled back to Freshwater on the evening train leaving Newport at 8.55pm for delivery in Totland Bay.



The second card was posted 20 years later in 1927 The stamp was now cancelled at Calbourne on August 5th, time code A for morning, and would again have been taken

by train to Newport for onward transportation to the Mainland. The writer

comments on the lack of postcards, saying she bought the available stock from the post office and that 'they date from the year dot'. The card is identical to the card sent in 1907.



### OLD GRAHAM'S PHILATELIC TALES No 7... By Graham Coles. October 2024

uring the autumn and winter of 1870-71, the city of Paris was besieged by Prussian troops. The beleaguered citizens attempted to correspond with the outside world by various means. The balloon post is well known to carry letters from Paris, but the French also made use of the River Seine itself to carry messages from the provinces to the capital. Several schemes were suggested, including use of a small submarine (which was partially constructed before the siege was lifted), but only one was adopted.

Three engineers, with the names of M. Robert, Delort and Vonoven, came up with the idea of using zinc balls about the size of a baby's head, which could hold letters, and then be soldered up. The zinc balls had fins on the side to help them catch the current. The density of the zinc was just enough for the ball to float, but not on the surface. On the 1st of December 1870 a gunboat left Paris, and went upstream towards the lines of the Prussian troops. At this point, the Parisian Director of Post (M.Rampont) threw one of the zinc balls into the current, and watched it float back towards the point where they had set out from. The following day, with the aid of a fishing net, the ball was recovered several miles downstream. On the 7th of December the intrepid pair of Robert and Delort left Paris by balloon with a stock of the zinc spheres, and floated over 100 miles until they could touchdown in un-occupied France. It took until the following month before permission was granted to send the first of the "boules".

On the 4th of January 1871, M.Robert disguised as a peasant, slipped through the Prussian lines to the banks of the Seine, and placed the boules into the water. For the rest of January 1871, he made numerous trips between the Post Office at Cosne, and the river to release the spheres. Some 40,000 letters had been collected to send to Paris, and it has been estimated that perhaps half of these were entrusted to the water. The public were asked to mark their letters "Paris par Moulins" to hide the secret from the enemy.

M.Roberts was based in Moulins, so the spheres are known as "Boules de Moulins". The normal postal tariff at this time was 20 centimes- sending it by water would cost you a Franc!

So you may well be asking, what happened to these letters? Some 55 Boules were released, but the Prussians had stretched fishing nets across the Seine, so it is believed that none of them actually reached Paris. Since 1871, boules have come to light from time to time, particularly in the period prior to 1910, but as recently as 1988, with their contents intact. Some 20 Boules are yet to be accounted for. The letters they contained were handed over to the addressees, or their descendants. Since 1982, they have been considered part of the French national heritage.

My last tale concluded with a little French tag, so I can use it again: Sacre Blue Mon Ami!

## VIA SOUTHAMPTON... By Malcolm Montgomery (MBE)... November 2024

ome years ago I began to notice that some envelopes were pre-printed 'Via Southampton' ... they were quite scarce but seemed to reach, or originate from, all corners of the globe. Those I could afford to buy I put aside for a collection that was to be called 'Southampton – Centre of the World' but, like many other aspirations, it has never been realised. The purpose of this article is twofold: first, to increase awareness of Southampton's importance as a centre for directing and facilitating correspondence to distant destinations and second, rather selfishly, to coax out other examples that might help to form a more comprehensive collection.

The primary purpose of the printed instruction was, of course, to ensure that correspondence was sent by the most appropriate, or cheapest, route, but it still surprises me that it appears on envelopes from the Americas, India, the Far East, the Pacific and Africa. Many of the correspondents were British, but not all, letters originating in France or more distant parts have also appeared. British correspondents could choose the earliest departure, or a cheaper route, Southampton rather than Marseilles, for instance. Overseas there were a range of reasons, but Southampton often appears to have been the preferred choice. I have illustrated a few and would like to hear of others, if you have any.

From Hong Kong: Hong Kong to London, via Southampton, 12th May 1861. A letter from a corporal serving with the 21st Fusiliers (see over) about to move from Varna to attack Sebastopol. The letter was directed 'via

Southampton' to avoid foreign postage but, the French Government having given permission for British Forces to send letters via France at the same rate as their French forces, threepence per quarter ounce, the letter in the event did not travel via Southampton. As the rate for soldiers and officers was the same by this route, no commanding officer's endorsement was necessary. (ex. Scott Archer).

England to Australia: Bristol, England, to Melbourne, Victoria, 18th July 1862. This is the earliest (and most recently acquired) of the printed-to-order envelopes that I have. It has a lilac imprint 'VIA SOUTHAMPTON' and was pre-paid sixpence, the rate for a letter weighing less than half of an ounce to Australia. Sent first to London, in accordance with its direction the letter was passed to Southampton (rather than to Marseilles, the more expensive, but faster, route). Carried first by the Peninsular & Oriental Company's ship 'Ripon', departing 20th July 1862 via Gibraltar and Malta, for Alexandria, then overland to Suez for the 'Bombay' to Galle and Melbourne. The letter arrived in Melbourne on 8th September 1862.

England to the United States: London, to Boston, via Southampton, 19th April 1869. A letter with a cachet applied by W. Brandt's, Sons & Co., at first directing it 'Via Cork' for the Inman Line 'City of Baltimore'. Recognising that there was an earlier sailing, the direction was changed to 'Via Southampton' for the North German Lloyd 'Hermann', calling at Southampton on 20th April 1869. The letter arrived in Boston on the 3rd May 1869.



India to the United States: Meerutt to the United States via Southampton and Queenstown, 29th March 1870. A cover, intended for mails via Southampton, apparently produced by a regiment in India for the benefit of its soldiers. Corporal Davies has paid an additional sixteen pies for British transit, nevertheless, a further three cents has been raised for United States inland postage. The letter was sent first to Bombay and by 'Meerut' to Suez on 16th April, then overland to Alexandria for 'Pera' sailing on 17th April for



Southampton on the 30th: thence via London to Queenstown. Ireland 'Samaria'. arriving in Boston on 14th 1870. May (ex Bryan Hunt).

France to Peru: Paris to Lima via Southampton, 15th September 1873. Letters from France, if so directed, could be sent to South America by British packets out of Southampton. Those from Paris normally passed through London and bear transit marks to that effect; the example below does not, but with a 'Gare du Nord' origin it is unlikely to have travelled via Le Havre to Southampton. It was paid two francs sixty centimes with a red 'P.P.' (Port Payé) directed 'VOIE DE SOUTHAMPTON / VOIE DE PANAMA' for the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's ship 'Tagus' out of Southampton on 17th September 1873 for Colon on 9th October; thence via Panama to Lima. There is no legible arrival handstamp, but the letter is endorsed as having been received on 18th October 1873.
